Artist of the month – James Thompson



Terry - – You are, along with others, a long standing member of SGA. How long have you indeed been a member and how would you describe you reasons for joining – long ago – and indeed what you enjoy about SGA.

James : Well, this is quite an honour, and as an enthusiastic amateur, many thanks for the quite undeserved privilege.

I have been a member of the SGA for about twenty years, joining when Marshall Kearney was chairman. I started by helping at exhibitions with preparing the walls, and hanging, and then he coerced me onto the Committee, to look after publicity and exhibitions. He got me to join, because Marshall was also Chairman of the Army Arts Society, which I had joined soon after retiring here in Bishopstone, twenty seven years ago.

I joined the AAS to exhibit and was soon helping with exhibitions and their publicity too. The SGA is a friendly group, with good exhibitions, where I have been lucky to make some sales. The cheerfulness and friendly atmosphere makes for more fun .. and painting must be fun. Terry -You must have a few stories and recollections to tell of past activities within SGA. Can I tempt you to tell some of those stories?

James : The SGA Committee was more relaxed after the AAS! Being on the committee for some years was a real pleasure, as I met so many more members. I remember particularly Susan Wiltshire, and her husband Ken. She was a professionally trained artist, a descendant of Cotman, the contemporary of Turner and Constable. Meetings at their house were a pleasure, surrounded by her lovely work and some by the great Cotman himself! Later I had fun working with Sandra Hammer and Austin Thorp and remember well erecting and displaying pictures, and then dismantling the display boards for both SGA exhibitions in the summer and for the AAS in the autumn.



Terry – I always find it fascinating to hear as to why people get interested in creating art. Indeed what is the 'fuel' that keeps you going? Tell us your story?

James : My interest in creating art comes from the colour and the skill of watercolourists. I enjoyed art at school, and had a painting accepted by the Towner Art Gallery in Eastbourne! I did little more until a posting to Belize with my battalion in late 1979. My wife, Annie, said I needed something to do in the evenings, and gallantly bought me paper, brushes and pencils. I already had a lovely little W&N watercolour set, a long ago gift from an arty aunt. I drew and painted quite a lot in Belize and sold some works to my friends. I continued in Uganda, and in York and Armagh, and always on holiday in France. I exhibited with the AAS and the Armed Forces Art Society in London, and Armagh and in York. I keep painting because 'it is there' and I think I might enjoy trying to capture a landscape or building in watercolour. Sometimes it works, and sometimes not.

Terry – A standard question to every Artist of the month is framed in very much the same way as this . I ask the question because it says so much about the artist in how it is answered. You are hosting a arty dinner party and you can invite anyone you like deceased or alive – Who would you invite?

James : What an opportunity to have dinner with so many talented and clever artists, I would love that. Among my guests might be: David Hockney with his colours and his delight in a smoke, van Gogh for his superb swirls, Lady Elisabeth Butler for her magnificent heroic military works, Michaelangelo for his ceilings (How did he do it?), and Leonardo da Vinci for his ideas and drawings. Perhaps Constable and Turner might be persuaded to come to help with watercolours, even Cotman too? One could go on for ever, and have such fun and learn so much.

Thank you for inviting me to chat about my art and why I do it. It gives me pleasure, it allows me quiet concentration, and you can slip away into your work. I really enjoy plein aire above all.

Our next exhibition opportunity is the SGA ArtCare Exhibition at Salisbury District Hospital from 29th November until 10th January. Have you chosen you 4 pictures to submit?

Attached below are the entry form and map for locating parking for ArtCare. 'Hand in' is on Monday 25th November from 10am until 3pm. 'Hand back' is on Monday 13th January from 10-3pm. It does get busy in the first hour of these sessions so we advise avoiding this time, if you are able to.

There will be 2 designated parking spaces outside the ArtCare office.

Entry is FREE. This year you may enter up to 4 pictures. Lesley Self, the organizer, advises that it would be a good idea to include 1 which is smaller and 'affordable', if possible. Remember the hospital takes 30% commission.

The exhibition is of pictures only, and not 3D works. **Maximum size** is **80cm x 80cm**. The hospital does not guarantee to hang all 4 of your pictures, this will be dependent on overall numbers submitted.

What you need to do. Fill in the attached form and just take it with your pictures to 'Hand in' at the ArtCare office, as above. Make sure all your pictures are correctly labelled with name, title ,medium and price and strung with cord for hanging. (see entry form).

New Gallery Opportunity

Ground

Hi there, my name is Deanne Tremlett, I am a Slade School and Wimbledon College graduate. Having cut my teeth as a curator at The Camden Art Space in London as an intern, whilst studying for my Master's degree, I have been curating and collaborating with artists and galleries in Dorset for the last 15 years.

In 2020 I set up the Guggleton Farm Arts CIC in Stalbridge, Dorset, and I am now collaborating with James Selkirk, in Wilton, at ground.

The space here is in part of the old Wilton Carpet factory, set in one of the two courtyards that have evolved into an eclectic and inspirational place over the last 400 years.

The first carpet weaving 'factory' in England was built at Wilton in 1655. In the early 1700s the industry was still largely domestic, but a significant developmental leap was made when the 9th Earl of Pembroke helped smuggle two Huguenot weavers out of France - thus helping to establish Wilton's global reputation as a place for innovation.

The concept behind the space is very much that too. The words most associated with our plans are collaboration, experimentation and engagement.

The vision for the space is one that is artist led, outward focussed and inclusive. I have long expressed my belief that it is the integrity that a maker brings to their craft that imbues it with value, whether that be a sculpture, painting or a greetings card. For this reason the gallery is set to run not just as an exhibition venue but also as a work space, social place and artist showcase.

Groundwork

Artists who show their work here will be encouraged to occupy the place and, in return for a competitive commission rate on any sales, help staff the gallery and use it as a studio space, making work and engaging with viewers as they do so. Creating the vibe that makes Open Studio events so popular with visitors and helping them to feel a sense of involvement in the creative process, possibly even informing it, a synergy of audience and producer. Thus allowing for their skills and experience to be shown alongside the results of their work and evidencing the inherent value of what they produce.

common ground

Alongside the exhibitions there will be a series of workshops, talks and events, led by the artists themselves, and aimed at pursuing collaboration with potential future audiences and makers. Evening events are planned, as are music, spoken word and literary groups.

Grounding

At the heart of the exercise going forward lies the intention to ensure that all who wish to are able to embark upon a creative journey, that those who have already begun theirs' are generous with the experience they have gained along the way and that as many people as possible get to exercise their creative muscles!







By car from Odstock Road:

- Turn in ENTRANCE B
- Follow road for 200yrds
- Just before 2nd zebra crossing
- Pull up on right hand side on yellow hatched area
- ArtCare office entrance is to the rear

Parking – During drop off and collection you will be able to temporarily pull up next to the ArtCare office free of charge. By bus - **From Salisbury city centre** Wilts & Dorset city service "R1" runs regularly from the city centre to the hospital. The bus leaves from Stop O in Blue Boar Row on the north side of the market square. The journey takes around 10 minutes. Buses run in an anti clockwise direction around the hospital site, use The Green stop for ArtCare office.

By rail- Salisbury has a direct rail link with London, Exeter, the West of England, Bristol, South Wales, Southampton and Portsmouth.
