Notes from the Editor



Artist of the Month – Norma Bell

Terry - The friendships we all make within SGA I cherish and enjoy. The banter, competition, debate and fun add to the delight of an enthusiastic group. One of our artists, Norma Bell, always gives me cheek and abuse. She insists I deserve it!

I always boast that I know an artist in SGA who had a work accepted a few years ago for the Summer Exhibition at the Royal Academy . And, of course, that was Norma who I have asked to tell us how we can do this too.



Norma- Art has been a leitmotif throughout my life. As a child I was surrounded by canvases, easels, oil paints, pastels, Indian ink, watercolours and all the 'tools' that go with them. And I used to muck about with all of them, the operative word being 'muck'!



My brother went on to be a professional artist while I pursued the study of art history and ended my professional life as an art historian, introducing enthusiasts to the Italian Renaissance.

After I retired I happened to attend an SGA demo in the old Harnham scout hut where Stephen Foster was demonstrating seascape painting using a palette knife and acrylics. For me it was a coup de foudre - I just knew I could do it! After the demo I went home and dug out a very scruffy palette knife and some cheapo acrylic paint and yes, I could do it and I've been doing it ever since!

I have achieved some successes along the way -' favourite painting' at the Fovant village hall art exhibition (prize £10), winner of the Edwin Young Trophy at the SGA Summer Exhibition, exhibiting at Westminster as part of the Remembrance Day service, attended by Prince Harry.





Terry is also nudging me to tell you about getting a painting into the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition. It's open to anyone who sends off for an entry form (£40 a pop).

You then send in a jpeg of your masterpiece and, if you are shortlisted, you hand in your painting/ sculpture/ installation to the RA for the final judging. If it is accepted the hard bit is putting a price on it. I solved the dilemma by simply adding a nought to my usual asking price.

The entry forms for this year's exhibition are on sale now, the deadline for the jpegs is 13th February. I urge you to have a go!

Alta Edwards- Wonderful World of Colour Workshop.

Alta Edwards organised a fascinating workshop on Saturday 27th January, looking at colour and using predominately acrylic and alchohol inks with small amounts of acrylic paint added where required.

The colours of the inks were very vibrant and everyone tried techniques that they had not used before, applying the inks with a lot of water and letting the inks form shapes as they covered the page. Adding layers of inks to the paintings enriched the colours further.

The results were very impressive, everyone produced very colourful and lively paintings and generally enjoyed trying out the new techniques.

"New Beginnings,' a collaborative exhibition between Plain Arts and Salisbury Group of Artists

6th-30th March at Gallery 4 at Salisbury Library *Private View- Friday March 8th, 6-7.30pm.*

As announced in our recent Newsflash, the submission form for our next exhibition opportunity is now live and can be accessed by clicking **HERE**....

The exhibition will be the first joint collaborative exhibition, with members of both Plain Arts and Salisbury Group of Artists invited to take part.

The title "New Beginnings' refers to the spirit of our two groups working together, not to the subject of your work, which can be anything you choose. It should be original artwork in 2D or 3D, in any medium and should not previously have been submitted for exhibition to Gallery 4 of the library.

The exhibition will include a 'large picture' exhibition in the main Gallery and a 'small picture' exhibition' in the Community Lounge. We are hoping for the most extensive 'small picture exhibition' so far! You will be able to submit 3 pictures, either 2 large and 1 small or 1 large and 2 small. SGA at Langford Lakes- a new exhibition opportunity!

We are very excited about this opportunity to hold an exhibition of members work at the Gallery, at Langford Lakes, home of Wiltshire Wildlife, for the whole of May. Hand In; Weds May 1st, 10.30am-1pm. Hand back; Friday May 31st; 10.30am-1pm

The Gallery is alongside the lovely Kingfisher Café, which looks across the largest lake. The Gallery is considerably is smaller than Gallery 4, so will be able to accommodate 2 pictures from each of around 20 artists, sizing to be confirmed, along with 3D pieces on central plinths. This could include ceramics, textiles and possibly also some craftwork/jewellery.

This exhibition must be stewarded by an SGA member during all open hours (Weds.-Sun. 10am -4pm) so submission is only open to artists and makers who are prepared to commit to steward 2 sessions, (10-1 or 1-4) during the month of May, a rota will be compiled for Wednesdays through to Sundays. (If we have fewer people taking part individuals will be able to enter more pieces, but may have to do an extra session).

The Magic of Singer Sargent

Talk - The Magic of Singer Sargent by Laura Bell

We painters of watercolours are very lucky in Salisbury to have two examples of Singer Sargent's work in this medium on our doorstep in the late Sir Edward Heath's home at Arundells. He was a supreme magician with watercolours and usually fills his fellow watercolourists with wonder and frustration. There is a bonus Singer Sargent at Arundells in the form of a small oil landscape. In this talk they will be discussing these three pictures for his technique in watercolour especially, drawing the distinction between that and his oil technique and perhaps revealing some of the secrets of this master of illusion, whilst also putting his work into the general context of contemporaneous and modern practices.


