Artist of the month Ela Anthony Your Newsletter Editor Talks to member artist Ela Anthony



Terry - At an exhibition I was at recently I was asked why I painted . My I ask that question of you ?

Ela - As a nurse, my job can be incredibly stressful, so painting has become my escape. I feel the need to unwind and take a break from the intensity of my work. When I paint, it calms me down and transports me to a different world. It's like therapy for me, offering a much-needed balance and peace.

Terry - Have you always painted and created jewellery and where does you inspiration come from ?

Ela - I've always been interested in painting. Even in school, my art teacher encouraged me to pursue it professionally and even gave me a recommendation for art school. However, around that time, my mother was diagnosed with terminal cancer, so I chose nursing, which felt more urgent and meaningful to me at the time. For many years, I didn't think about painting at all.

However, I often visited art galleries and museums with my young daughters as a way to spend quality time together in our busy lives. Time didn't allow for much else. It wasn't until years later, with the stressful work environment, then later on COVID, and the enforced isolation, that I felt inspired to express my emotions through painting again. I remember my first piece, inspired by my daughter's description of a music box. Since then, my focus has shifted dramatically. I now draw inspiration mainly from nature, the seasons, the world around us, and the emotions we experience in daily life. I never plan or sketch; I concentrate on channeling my emotions. Usually, the final result is quite different from the original idea!

As for jewellery, that's a funny story. Last year, I celebrated my 60th birthday, and my



daughters organized a trip to Ireland (my younger daughter lives in Cork). On the way from the airport, they took me to watch the sunset on a beach filled with broken, shimmering shells, mother of pearl, and stones. At that moment, I knew I wanted to capture that memory and keep a part of it with me always – and that's how I got the idea for my first pendant.

Terry - You obviously have a busy life , how do you fit everything in? Describe perhaps your perfect art filled day.

Ela - My ideal day would start with a cup of coffee and some art magazines (digital is

fine too!), followed by a sunny walk to observe nature waking up after the night. With unlimited time, I'd spend the entire afternoon painting or making jewelry. Honestly, I often find myself doing this even when I'm pressed for time! I work night shifts, so theoretically, I have all day to devote to art. Sleep is overrated!

Terry - I ask this question of our artists often . I so like the varied answers I get !

Can I ask if you were organising a dinner party of your favourite artists who would you invite and why? They can be from the past as well as the present.

I would choose Władysław Hasior. His work, which often combines surrealism with folk art and elements of the grotesque, is incredibly intriguing and many years ago, hugEla influenced the way I perceive art today. Hasior's ability to transform everyday objects into profound and evocative pieces is something I deeply admire. His art challenges conventional boundaries and evokes a powerful sense of curiosity and introspection. I would love to explore his creative process and understand how he drew inspiration from such diverse sources. Discussing his innovative techniques and his perspective on art would be an extraordinary opportunity to gain insights that could profoundly influence my own artistic journey.

I would also invite Frida Kahlo! Her extraordinary ability to use colours, shapes, and patterns is hug Ela impactful and inspiring. Growing up, I was brought up to be very quiet, reserved, and calm, but whenever I'm in nature, I always feel a rush of excitement and extraversion that I believe is still within me. My art is a great outlet to express that hidden vibrancy. I would love to tap into Frida's knowledge and insights, learning how she channeled her intense emotions and unique perspective into her work. It would be an incredible opportunity to gain inspiration from someone who truly mastered the art of self-expression.

Workshop Update May From Annie George Here is a review of Michael Parker's workshop by Joanna Percival;



A Wonderful Workshop with Artist Michael Parker

Ten SGA Members and friends discovered how to paint using palette knives. No one had to stand at one end of the room while Michael threw knives around us! Instead, we watched Michael demonstrate how he approaches painting a kingfisher coming out of water. He explained about loading the paint on the side opposite to the way you are going to move your palette knife and some of the effects you can get. Then we painted cockerels or a kingfisher from a painting we had brought with us. All of them were so different and very creative.

I did not think I wanted to paint a cockerel but when I saw the lush viridian green feathers thickly painted and glistening in one person's painting, I quickly changed my mind.

Several of us said how free we felt painting in this way. 'There are no mistakes' Michael said. 'This painting belongs to you.' I felt it stretched me as an artist. We all commented on how much more paint we were using, which we thought was a very good thing.

Tiny thin lines can be made using the side of the palette knife, giving a feeling of movement and he showed us how to create reflections in water. The experience was of being bold in creating textures that made our paintings more exciting. Backgrounds took on lovEla textures that in several paintings really worked to enhance the subject. I noticed how much more I was moving my wrists and hands (both) to create unusual marks on the canvas or board. Michael was an excellent and encouraging instructor and I know that several of us will continue to paint using palette knives having gained confidence and seen good results in our work.

Several of us said we would like Michael to come back for another session focusing on landscape painting with palette knives. I would sign up for that!

Martin Webster Chairman welcomed all to the meeting with an 'arty quote'

'Life is Art , Art is Life.'

Martin talked of a good year recognising that he felt all we did we did well and continued to grow as an organisation with a strong membership. He gave thanks to all for being part . Genny has been recruited as our Social Secretary and is looking at the possible planning of a trip to the RA Exhibition . People were invited to show interest. A new Social Media consultant has been appointed . He stated SGA is also are also looking at the redesign of our logo.

Treasurers Report – Rose Duly

Rose detailed some items from the accounts indicating that SGA had recorded a loss despite income and membership holding up. Equipment storage, workshops income losses, additionally website costs account for the losses. Additionally the loss of commission from Gallery 4 picture sales all added to this. Change within the coming year will reduce losses with for example the equipment storage moving with SGAs thanks to Genny's Garage.

The accounts were accepted unanimously by the meeting.

At the Plain Arts liaison exhibition there was a busy Private View with a special guest of the City Mayor .(Ken sold him his picture !) The Hospital Exhibition attracted fewer artists, with the suggestion that the hand in area is an issue,

Exhibitions at the Antelope Cafe continued and there was an appeal for future exhibitors.

Annie finished with an appeal that members prepare for our Summer Exhibition.

Martin thanked Annie for the passion she puts into her role.

Membership - Paul and Lyn Ryder

Paul advised all that we are at 200 members and the membership is healthy. Over the year the numbers increased 48 with 10 leavers for a variety of reasons. It was recommended to keep fees as they are with renewals going out monthly. He remarked there are five different ways to pay which may need to be reviewed.
